

Weather radios are lifesavers; after storm safety needed, too

Tornado season is well underway in north Missouri and as early as late February severe weather specialists were issuing warnings of possible above average tornadic activity this spring in this area.

Whether or not the predicted rise in severe weather occurs, there is one item that should be standard equipment in every home and business.

Weather radios provide life-saving information that will allow you and your family to take shelter before those dangerous spring and summer storms arrive. The radios work 24-hours-a-day, seven days-a-week to protect you and your family. 131092

Weather radios can be purchased from FEC for \$58.27, plus \$4.21 tax for a total of \$62.48. We can even ship the radio to you for an additional \$5.

"We have one of these radios in our front office and when it comes on it immediately gets everyone's attention," said Steve Shoot, FEC Manager of Member Services. "The National Weather Service provides detailed information on the upcoming storm and in the specific areas that could be

in the storm's path."

According to Shoot, there are a number of settings on the radio that allows the individual to receive warnings on only specific types of storms.

"Some folks may not care about a severe thunderstorm alert, for example, while other families may want to be made aware of every potentially severe weather scenario," said Shoot. "This weather radio allows you to establish the settings that are the most specific to your needs."

After The Storm Has Passed

Safety after a storm has passed is as important as any of the preventative measures you took prior to the storm's arrival.

For example, there could be broken power poles

with lines on the ground. Or, some power lines, which are still energized, may be hidden by damaged trees and limbs that have fallen, concealing what could be a hazardous situation from view.

Another issue to contend with involves people cleaning up after the storm.

The problem? People using electrically powered tools in wet conditions.

If you need to enter a storm-damaged building be sure the electrical ser-

vices are turned off. Never attempt to turn off the main breaker at the panel box if you are standing in a pool of water.

One final note. Never step into a flooded basement or other area if water is covering electrical outlets, appliances or electrical cords.

Now is the time to Spring into energy efficiency action at home

Before summer's heat and humidity hit, take advantage of spring's more moderate temperatures to make some energy-efficiency improvements around your house.

Here are some efficiency tips to get you ready for summer:

"Spring" clean filters, fans and AC – Replace or clean your air conditioner's filters every month you use it. Dirty filters can block airflow and reduce efficiency, causing the unit to work overtime. Also clean fans and refrigerator coils while you're at it, and adjust ceiling fan blades to draw air upward.

Also don't wait until summer to call your heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) professional. Schedule a spring cleaning of your air conditioner.

If you're replacing a system, consider a high-efficiency unit that is Energy Star qualified – it could save up to 20 percent on cooling costs and use 25 percent to 40 percent less energy than a new conventional system, according to Energy Star. 277304

Seal the leaks – The same weather stripping, caulking and insulation you use to keep the cold air out in winter also will keep the cool air inside in summer. Spring is a good time to

insulate your home's outer walls, particularly around windows, doors and electrical outlets. If you're in the market for new windows, choose Energy Star windows or the most efficient ones you can afford.

Install storm doors if you're in a hot climate, or replace them with screens in a more temperate climate.

Remember to close the flue in your fireplace. Check air ducts for leaks and the level of attic insulation to see if it's settled. R-49 is now the insulation standard for attics in north Missouri. 181719

Install a programmable thermostat – You'll reap the same benefits in summer from a programmable thermostat as you do in winter.

If set and used properly, a programmable thermostat can save up to \$150 in energy costs each year, according to Energy Star. Each degree in summer you raise the thermostat typically saves 3 percent on your cooling bill.

Energy experts recommend setting the thermostat at 78 degrees or above in summer.

Open up your house – Use natural light to illuminate your house, particularly if you're

Landscaping can save you cash on your monthly energy bill

Landscaping is more than placing trees and shrubs in specific locations for aesthetic purposes. Proper landscaping can also make a significant difference in your monthly energy bill.

Well-thought out landscaping can lower bills in the summer and winter. Here's how:

- Plant deciduous trees with high crowns, such as oaks and maples, and tall shrubs, such as privet hedge, on the east and south-west to block morning or afternoon heat buildup, and plant trees with lower crowns, such as dogwoods and crabapples on the west to block low-angle afternoon rays; plant evergreens if you want continuous shade. 300722
- Plant trees and shrubs to channel cooling breezes into the house or across a shaded patio; keep lower limbs pruned up to allow breezes to pass underneath shade trees; Energy Efficient Landscaping at:

A simple watt meter allows you to understand usage

It's not always easy to save energy, especially if you don't know how much electricity each of your appliances uses every month.

With a small investment of less than \$40 you can purchase a watt meter that will provide you with specific information as to how much each of your appliances is using when it is turned on and, surprisingly, how much it is using **when it is turned off**.

Some of the watt meters can even tell you how much energy that appliance will use in a day, month, or year, and convert that usage into dollars and cents.

Try the watt meter on your large appliances.

The occasional blink is a positive sign the electrical distribution system in your area is working correctly

Let's face it. Blinking clocks on stoves and microwaves are a hassle to contend with if they occur on a regular basis.

However, an occasional blink is a positive sign the distribution system in your area is working properly.

Blinks are usually the result of brush that has or is growing into the power lines, or wildlife, such as squirrels or large birds, that come into contact with the energized lines.

FEC does have an extensive brush clearing program that removes miles of brush each year. However, FEC's overall distribution system totals nearly 3,800 miles of line, making it difficult to keep up with the constant attempts at encroachment by Mother Nature.

Blinks occur when, for example, a tree limb brushes up against a power line. The contact is detected by a piece of equipment called an oil circuit recloser (OCR). Its job is to detect power surges and stop the flow of electricity when there is a potential problem. It is similar to a circuit breaker in your home, however, it

- While young trees are growing, plant quick-growing vines, such as wisteria and honeysuckle, to climb on trellises and arbors.
- If your house lacks a roof overhang on the south, plant deciduous trees and shrubs to shade south walls in summer; however, for year-round energy efficiency, leave the south side of the house unshaded, since in winter, trees without leaves can still block as much as 60 percent of the sun.
- Reduce the "heat island" effect around your home with pervious paving, light-colored paving materials, shade, less pavement, organic mulches (instead of rock or gravel) and water-efficient turf grass; an unshaded concrete driveway can be as much as 35 degrees warmer than surrounding lawn.
- The distance from tree to house should be

Try them on your small appliances. You can even use the watt meter to teach your children how much energy **AND** money they are wasting when they leave the lights on in an empty room. 250212

There is a group of energy wasters known as "Phantom Loads," that use more power than previously thought. It is now estimated by the Department of Energy that approximately 15% of every electric bill is the result of a phantom load. A cell phone charger that is plugged in but not charging a phone is using power. By using the watt meter you can determine how much money you are wasting and take action.

has a special feature your circuit breakers at home do not have.

When the tree limb came into contact with the power line, the OCR immediately opened, stopping the flow of electricity. That is the blink that causes the clock on your microwave to flash.

However, the difference between your circuit breaker at home and the OCR is the OCR will re-set itself. If the tree limb is no longer in contact with the power line the OCR will automatically re-set itself and power is restored to the line.

If the branch remains on the power line, the OCR will operate two more times, off-on, off-on, before opening for good, causing a power outage.

FEC's automatic meter reading system is also designed to record blinks on your power line. If you are experiencing a number of blinks at your home, contact the FEC office in Chillicothe.

about half the width of the tree's mature canopy; the University of Missouri Extension Service recommends planting large trees at least 20 feet from a house and smaller trees or those with columnar shapes at 15 feet or closer.

- In mid-summer a 50-foot tree with a 30-foot spread will cast a shadow at 3 or 4 p.m. equal to its height, but in winter that shadow will be 120 feet.
- A 6- to 8-foot deciduous tree near your home will begin shading windows the first year; depending on the species and the home, the tree will shade the roof in 5 to 10 years.
- Shade your air conditioner or exterior heat pump; efficiency will improve by as much as 10 percent; plant no closer than 3 feet, so there's plenty of air flow to the unit.
- To block hot summer winds, plant a wind-break on the windward side of your house.

DNR has cash rebates for specific appliances

If you haven't spent your tax refund yet, think about investing it in energy-efficient appliances this spring — and get money back in the process.

Farmers' Electric does offer rebates on specific appliances and now the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has \$5.6 million in federal stimulus funds to spend on an Energy Star appliance rebate program.

You can download a fact sheet about the rebates at <http://www.dnr.mo.gov/pubs/pub-2385.pdf>. But in short here are the appliances and their rebates:

- Gas furnaces - \$125
- Air-source heat pumps- \$250
- Central air conditioning - \$100
- Water heaters – gas storage - \$100
- Water heaters – gas tankless - \$100
- Water heaters – solar (with gas backup) - \$500
- Water heaters – electric heat pump - \$150
- Water heaters – solar (with electric backup) - \$500
- Clothes washers - \$75
- Dishwashers - \$75

Federal tax credits also are available for qualifying nonsolar water heaters, air-source heat pumps and central air conditioning units. They cover 30 percent of the cost up to \$1,500 and expire Dec. 31, 2010.

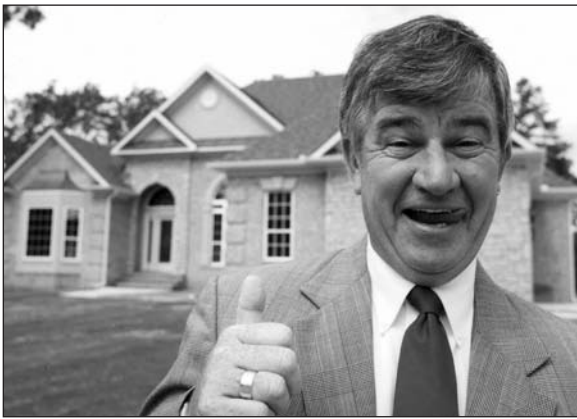
May I wish you a happy springtime?

We have warmer weather, pretty flowers, biting fish and it seems we are all more cheerful.

Those of you who read this column and listen to our "Home Remedies" radio program probably think that Professor Tom and I are greatly excited about the General Electric Hybrid water heater (now called GeoSpring) and you are right.

Why are we excited? Because rarely does a new product come along that actually

performs as well as advertised and is feasible, as well as good for the consumer. Tom and I have been in the energy efficiency field for a combined 50 years and we have seen many so-called miracle products come and, mostly, go.

We have seen the magic black boxes, the many different room heaters, the unbelievable sheets of aluminum foil, and many others. In my opinion there are individual cases where these products may actually help but almost never will they perform at the advertised 30, 40, or 50 percent savings.

I believe that the GeoSpring will perform

exactly as we wrote about in last month's column.

By the way, that column drew a big response from you, the readers. The most often asked questions were, "What is the price?" and "How can it be 200 percent efficient?" Well, you can call your local GE dealer for the current price and I will handle the efficiency question.

The engineering term that is used to state the efficiency is "coefficient of performance" or "COP." I like to say that the "COP" tells us how efficient the product converts a unit of electricity to heat.

Here are three examples.

As you try to move electricity through a metal wire it meets resistance. In some metal coils the resistance is so great that the coil glows red hot.

You would recognize this in a toaster, a hair dryer, some electric room heaters and in an electric furnace. Most electric heaters have a COP of

1.00 or an efficiency of 100 percent. One unit of electricity in and one unit of heat out.

A heat pump is totally different. It uses a compressor to move heat from one location to another and it does it at higher efficiencies.

Think of your refrigerator as the compressor runs and takes the heat out of the milk and puts that heat in the kitchen from the back of

the refrigerator. The COP of a properly installed heat pump is about 2.5 or about 250 percent efficient at 40 degrees or warmer. One unit of electricity in and 2.5 units of heat out.

A geothermal heating system has a COP of about 4.00 and one model has a COP of 5.00. One unit of electricity in and 4 or 5 units of heat out. Wow, what do you think of that?

When someone asks me how a heat pump works, I usually

just say "really good." Gas water heaters do not have COP ratings because they are not electric.

They have an Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency (AFUE) rating. The AFUE rating of most gas water heaters is 57 percent or less. That simply

means that about 43 percent of the gas goes straight up the flue to the sky above.

I honestly believe that the GeoSpring will deliver you hot water at over 200 percent efficiency.

It's your choice.

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still using incandescent light bulbs. Nearly 90 percent of the electricity used by these bulbs is turned into wasted heat, not light. So leave lights off during the day.

Throw open your windows to let warm spring breezes in instead of running the furnace.

Hang out your clothes to dry – Let warm breezes dry your clothes on an outdoor line.

Cook outside or microwave – Your stove and oven can quickly heat up the kitchen. This may be welcome in the winter but not in the spring and summer. So do more outdoor grilling or use efficient appliances like microwaves and crock pots. That will mean less work for your air conditioner.

Shade your house – Spring is a perfect time to update your landscaping. Summer will be too late for new plants to thrive. A 6-foot to 8-foot deciduous tree planted near your home will begin shading windows the first year. Depending on the species and the home, the tree will shade the roof in five to 10 years.

If you have an air conditioner, shading the unit can

increase its efficiency by as much as 10 percent.

Just three properly placed trees can save from \$100 to \$250 in yearly energy costs, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. Trees cool the air temperatures beneath and around them. Trees, shrubs, and groundcover plants that shade the ground and pavement around your house reduce radiation and cool the air before it reaches your home's walls and windows.

Use a large bush or row of shrubs to shade a patio or driveway. Plant a

hedge to shade a sidewalk. Build a trellis for climbing vines to shade a patio area.

One word of caution: Be sure that your plantings will not grow into powerlines.

Shade your windows – Don't wait until summer to install drapes, blinds, exterior shades and other window coverings. Applying solar control window films to existing glass is an effective method to reduce the amount of solar light and heat entering your windows. This method can save 5 percent to 10 percent on your energy bill, says California's Con-

sumer Energy Center.

Go light – Ready for a fresh face on your house? Light-colored exteriors reflect most of the radiant energy from the sun away from your house. Dull or dark home exteriors absorb 70 percent to 80 percent. So if you're considering a new paint job, go light versus dark.

Clean your water heater – The hotter the water in your water heater, the more likely you have calcium, lime and rust buildup.

Keep your water heater at 120 degrees to reduce the buildup. To remove scales, flush out the heater once a year. Detailed instructions are at <http://www.wikihow.com/Flush-a-Water-Heater> to do it yourself, or hire a plumber. Turn it up – If you have central air conditioning, keep your thermostat at 78 degrees. You can also save approximately an additional 6 to 7 percent off your cooling costs for each degree above 78. If your air conditioner does not have a thermostat, adjust it to a lower setting, or combine using it with a window or ceiling fan to cool things down.
